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Two Chicago Icons Forge Peace Accord: Hot Doug Sohn and Alderman Joe Moore To Bury Hatchet at Uptown Camp Daniel Biss

SKOKIE, Ill. — In what some have described as the Camp David Accord of the new millennium, Doug Sohn and Joe Moore will bury the foie gras hatchet at the Hot Doug Classic on June 6.

An outspoken opponent of animal cruelty, Alderman Joe Moore sponsored a Chicago City ordinance banning the sale of foie gras in 2006. The ban was repealed in 2008, after only a single scofflaw had received a fine: Hot Doug Sohn, in March 2007. Doug, who continued serving foie gras at his Avondale neighborhood place, was the only restaurateur to openly violate the ban. Sohn now legally serves foie gras at Hot Doug's, but these two adversaries have still never met, and have not spoken. They will come together and resolve their differences once and for all at the Hot Doug Classic at Camp Daniel on June 6th.
